
CHRISTMAS BOOK LIST

There are also some ideas of children's books, the ages are just a guide. Enjoy!




Our Missing Hearts by Celeste Ng


Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus


Days at the Morisaki Bookshop by Satoshi Yagisawa

Set in Tokyo, a broken-hearted young woman finds refuge in the world of her uncle's second-hand bookshop. A heartwarming tale about the healing power of reading.




Babel by R F Kuang

This a Gothic fantasy novel set in a dystopian 19th century Oxford. It is about the power of language and the violence of colonialism.




The Drift by C J Tudor

Following a deadly storm, this story follows three groups of stranded individuals surrounded by secrets and the occasional dead body. A spine chilling winter thriller with a hint of horror.




Really good, actually by Monica Heisey


Tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow by Gabrielle Zevin

A heartwarming tale of human connection, creativity and collaboration as two children who meet in a hospital go on to pursue their dreams and identities through the production of video games.




Lessons by Ian McEwan

Demon Copperhead by Barbara Kingsolver


Karma by Boy George

A heartwarming tale of a bear cub concerned with the supply of dreams for the long winter slumber. Age 0-5.




Dormouse has a Cold by Julia Donaldson and Axel Scheffler

Accompanied by over twenty original songs penned by the author, this is a funny festive treat that sees young Leo rather rashly wish away all things Christmas. Age 7-10.




The Christmasaurus Carol by Tom Fletcher


The Miraculous Sweetmakers – The Frost Fair by Natasha Hastings

This new book by David Walliams follows the hilarious escapades of an upper-class family in their crumbling stately home. Age 9-12.




Impossible Creatures by Katherine Rundell

A delightful fantasy which finds an ordinary boy and a flying girl enmeshed in an adventure with a host of magical creatures. Age 9-12.




Heartstopper Volume 5 by Alice Oseman


Island of Whispers by Francis Hardinge
