

This document explains the information on your young person's report. This information can be based on formal assessment weeks, one-off classroom assessments or a holistic view of class and homework over a period of time.

Year 11 reports use Target Grades with reports indicating the grade the student has the highest percentage chance of attaining (FFT20) along with the grade at which they are currently working.

The information you will find on the report is:

<p><b>Teacher</b></p>	<p>The teacher for the subject. Teachers can be contacted by email; please use the staff member's first initial and surname then add @carringtonschool.org, for example mlockhart@carringtonschool.org. A <a href="#">list of all staff can be found HERE</a>.</p>
<p><b>FFT20 (Expected Goal)</b></p>	<p>This is the grade the student has the highest percentage chance of attaining and is based on national analysis of outcomes for students with similar backgrounds and similar test results in Year 6 and/or Year 7.</p>
<p><b>Current Grade</b></p>	<p>This is the teacher judgment of the standard at which the student is currently working, based on observations and work undertaken.</p> <p>For GCSEs the grades in most to least challenging order are 9-1.</p> <p>For vocational qualifications, grading is by level (Level 2 down to Level 1) and criteria (Distinction, Merit, Pass).</p> <p>A grade which includes "+" indicates the student is currently securely demonstrating the skills required to achieve the grade.</p> <p>A grade which includes "-" indicates the student is not consistently demonstrating the skills required to achieve the grade.</p>
<p><b>Attitude to Learning</b></p>	<p>A teacher judgment of how the student approaches their learning. The categories are:</p> <p><b>Star Learner</b> – actively engages in class activities, attempts Ad Astra tasks, completes homework to a high standard</p> <p><b>Motivated Learner</b> – completes all class and homework activities to a good standard</p> <p><b>Reluctant Learner</b> – does not complete class or homework to the best of their ability; can be off-task and distracted</p>
