Key Stage 4: The Curriculum

All students will study 'core' subjects – 5 subjects.

In addition, students will select 3 options.

Fewer than previous years
Increase deep learning
More time in English and Mathematics





The Core Curriculum

English Language 1 GCSE

English Literature 1 GCSE

Mathematics 1 GCSE

Science 2 GCSEs

Philosophy & Ethics* 1 GCSE

PE & PSHE are not examined

TOTAL 6 GCSEs

32 out of 50 lessons or 64% of a timetable





The Core Curriculum – why?

Legislation

Needed by college and employers who demand good levels of literacy and numeracy.

English and Maths – resit post 16 if students do not achieve grade 5 or above.



The Options



You select 3 courses that you would like to study.

Blocks – you have to choose 1 subject from each block.

Each subject will have 6 teaching hours per fortnight.

Options occupy 18 out of 50 lessons or 36% of a timetable

6 core subjects + 3 option subject = 9 qualifications



Some changes to examinations


Graded 9-1 with 9 being the highest grade.

Greater emphasis on testing at the end of the course – reduction in Non Examined Assessment.

Greater emphasis on the quality of written communication, good literacy skills.

Changes to the school leaving age —need to be in education or training to age 18.







Performance Measures

From 2016:

- Progress 8 progress students make against expected progress over 8 subjects – one average grade for entire cohort.
- Attainment 8 Average grade of an entire cohort across 8 subjects.
- * achieving EBACC.
- C/5 and above in English and Maths.

Qualifications – GCSE Level 2

General Certificate of Secondary Education

Mainly terminal examination.

Some Non Examined Assessment.

Viewed as academic.

Grades 9-1.







Reformed GCSEs

- will have more demanding content
- have been designed for a two-year period of study
- •will be linear, so students will take all of their exams at the end of the course
- degree of non-exam assessment will reflect balance and nature of new subject content
- •will have a new grading scale from 9 (top grade) to 1 students studying combined science will receive one of 17 possible grades, from 9-9, 9-8, 8-8, 8-7... to 1-1

Science GCSEs are changing in England

- Students do at least 8 practical activities (16 for combined science) covering specific apparatus and techniques.
- Exam questions about practical work make up at least 15% of the total marks for the qualification.
- As with all reformed
 GCSEs, the content is more challenging than previous
 GCSEs graded A* to G.

- Each single science will be worth one GCSE grade.
 Combined science will be an award worth 2 GCSEs.
- •Students taking separate science GCSEs will get a grade from 9 to 1 for each subject, with 9 being the highest grade.
- Students studying combined science will receive an award worth two GCSEs, consisting of two equal or adjacent grades from 9 to 1 (9-9, 9-8, 8-8, 8-7, 7-7...to 1-1).
- If the numbers are different, the highest number will always be reported on the left.
- •The new grades have been brought in to signal that GCSEs have been reformed and to better differentiate between students of different abilities.

Mixture of Portfolio work (25%) and External Assessment (75%, 25%).

1 GCSE equivalent.

Level 2 = 9-4

Level 1 = 3-1

Level 1 qualification only = grades 1-3.

Students have been invited to apply – not suitable for all, limited availability.


